

This study relates to the area bounded by Hale Street, Musgrave Road, Petrie Terrace and Milton Road, and primarily the residential area behind the mixed commercial street frontages of Caxton Street and Petrie Terrace. City Plan 2014 has much of the area zoned CH1 Character Residential.


The area was the subject of a field study undertaken by the National Trust in 1977, suggesting they were active in designating this town planning/development constraint. The BHG Research Library has digitised copies of many of the worksheets for each individual property, and photographic prints of some of the buildings and houses from that time. Rod Fisher and his associates subsequently, during the 1980s, returned and photographed the buildings again.

Forty years later we decided it was time for an update, and this set of street albums provides a snapshot of how the houses, predominantly small lot timber cottages, have been adapted for current day living. The area was predominantly working class in the 1970s, however, as with other older city fringe suburbs this has changed over time. It will primarily be of interest to residents interested in the history of their home, and we would welcome feedback, particularly if you would like to share this information in future updates.

For the albums we have used scanned copies of photographic prints when available, photocopies when not, and digital images for current conditions. A number of the houses photographed in the 1980s included side and rear views which can be made available on request. There appears to have been some renumbering of properties over time – apologies in advance if we have erred.



"THE ROYAL DANE."

Sir,-As a constant reader of estimable paper, I have always taken great interest in reading your weekly column of the doings of 50 years ago, and naturally looked forward to the issue of Saturday, the 3rd of December, as it was on the 2nd of December, 50 years ago, that I landed in sunny Queensland as a passenger by the good old ship, "The Royal Dane." Having noticed a letter from a Royal Dane passenger, and later one by Mr. F. Woods, mentioning, among other things, my name in conjunction with Mr. Le Grand. I would like to mention that Mr. Le Grand left England with the intention of going in for sheep farming, and brought out with him two rams and two ewes, which had a lamb each, born on the voyage. They were all pure bred Spanish merinos, but on arrival in Queensland Mr. Le Grand was unable to obtain suitable land for sheep farming, so he disposed of his sheep to the late Sir Joshua Peter Bell, of Jimbour station, for After this he took a good figure. in the Dugandan district, land up and went in for grape growing and wine making. He and his wife and sister-in-law have been dead some years, but a family of sever sons are all twing, being engaged in different lucrative positions in and around Brisbane. I might mention that the Royal Dane was a clipper-built ship, and a very fast caller, and her skipper, Captain Bolt, was an old naval reserve man, and was very popular with all the emigrants. The voyage out was a long one, as we left Gravesend on August 16, and did not arrive in Moreton Bay till Missing the trade winds December 2. after crossing the line, and being becalmed for several days in the tropics, was the cause of a lot of lost time, but this did not trouble us young folk, as there was always plenty to occupy our time with. I myself am in the Railway Stones Depart ment, and am still going strong. Wishing the "Courier" staff a happy and prosperors New Year.—I am, sir. &c., JAMES A. MASSY, passenger by the Royal Dane, 1871. Avon-street, Petrie-terrace, December 29.









