



This study relates to the area bounded by Hale Street, Musgrave Road, Petrie Terrace and Milton Road, and primarily the residential area behind the mixed commercial street frontages of Caxton Street and Petrie Terrace. City Plan 2014 has much of the area zoned CH1 Character Residential.


The area was the subject of a field study undertaken by the National Trust in 1977, suggesting they were active in designating this town planning/development constraint. The BHG Research Library has digitised copies of many of the worksheets for each individual property, and photographic prints of some of the buildings and houses from that time. Rod Fisher and his associates subsequently, during the 1980s, returned and photographed the buildings again.

Forty years later we decided it was time for an update, and this set of street albums provides a snapshot of how the houses, predominantly small lot timber cottages, have been adapted for current day living. The area was predominantly working class in the 1970s, however, as with other older city fringe suburbs this has changed over time. It will primarily be of interest to residents interested in the history of their home, and we would welcome feedback, particularly if you would like to share this information in future updates.

For the albums we have used scanned copies of photographic prints when available, photocopies when not, and digital images for current conditions. A number of the houses photographed in the 1980s included side and rear views which can be made available on request. There appears to have been some renumbering of properties over time – apologies in advance if we have erred.

Your comments and corrections will be appreciated.







Perhaps the first owner of the house at 17 Sheriff Street, corner of Weetman Street (which was formerly named Cathie Lane), was my 2nd great grandfather Robert Cathie after whom the Lane derived its name. Many years later the Council changed that name to Weetman Street.

I can only remember visiting 17 Sheriff Street with my Mum once, and on reflection it may have been after the death of John Francis Carroll (1969) as I would have been only nine years of age. I can't recall any details of the house except that there was a dirt floor downstairs and a large brick wall on the Weetman Street side which was probably a retaining wall for that street. I can recall seeing Eugene Carroll there and my Mum may have been helping him clean up the house.

The house at 13 Weetman Street, was also home to my great grandparent Thomas Joshua Carroll. By 1905 Robert and Sarah Cathie had moved to Wynnum and the Sheriff Street house was then occupied by their daughter Sarah who had married next door neighbour Thomas Carroll, who had resided there for several years. For over 60 years, members of the Carroll family continued to reside at No 17 Sheriff Street.







#### JOHNSTON'S HOUSE c 1887 – 47 Sheriff Street

During the 1880s the four-square, light-framed, pyramid-roofed workers dwelling became the dominant housing type in Petrie Terrace, as it did throughout Brisbane at large. This was a brilliant, though evolutionary solution, to the problem of providing cheap, durable, compact and aesthetic accommodation, especially during the expansive 1880s.

For more space, an old two-roomed cottage could be doubled in area and surmounted by a new pyramid roof. Or if someone had the capital to begin with, why not build two floors, using the ground level for either residential or business purposes. Moreover a ground level house could be turned into two storeys, as seen at Johnston's house at No 47 Sheriff Street.

Here an earlier dwelling was raised high on stumps, the chimney re-bricked, a flight of steps built into the front and back verandahs, the sub-floor lined as rooms, and a low picket fence with a gate run along the lower verandah posts. Judging by the newer joinery and street directories, this was completed around 1910, probably for sub-rental or family purposes.

The original house was possibly built by Stephen Ashley, a Sheriff Street carpenter, for William Blanchard, a commission agent of nearby Paddington, in 1887. In the next year, Mrs Johnston, laundress, was the householder listed and then John Johnston, labourer, until he vanishes from the directories in 1929. Blanchard was evidently a victim of the disastrous nineties, as Johnston gained a legal caveat forbidding the registration of any land dealings in 1892, followed by a Supreme Court order vesting the property in his name. The title was transferred to his wife Mary in 1894, who was the householder listed from 1930 until her death thirteen years later.

In 1888 their neighbours included Emil Jurich, his thirty-year-old wife Elizabeth and their two young children. She had been unwell for several days, but instead of visiting a doctor she obtained a painkiller from the local chemist, and vomited for another couple of days. On returning from the gasworks in town, Jurich found his wife lying dead upon the bed, and the half full bottle on the table. In one of those strange quirks of history, Jurich is next sighted in 1889 as a bottle-O of Fortitude Valley. Until then he does not even appear in the street directories.

In comparison the Johnstons lived at Sheriff Street for 55 years and the next owner for 37 more. Nothing is known about them personally, but they bequeathed to posterity a most unusual house. Its exterior had hardly seen a drop of paint this side of the nineteenth century, and its interior, never – a common feature of early timber housing. All of its original elements were still intact – the absolute envy of any would-be restorer.






